



Eldersfield Lawn C.E. Primary School P.E. and Sports - Evidencing the Impact of Funding



Review of last year's spend and key achievements 2022 -2023

Eldersfield Lawn school received a total of £7,033 of P.E. and sports premium funding during 2022-23.

- The table below shows the Intent, Implementation and Impact of how this funding has been used to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of P.E., Sport and Physical Education which we offer to our pupils.
- The plan aims to and has provided opportunities to build capacity and capability, ensuring the improvements we make are of benefit to the pupils who attend, join us both now and in future years.
- The plan is also designed to develop and add to the P.E. Sports and Physical activities Eldersfield Lawn School already provides.

<u>To increase the level of children's participation in competitive sports</u> <u>Key Indicator 5 - Increased participation in competitive sport</u>	Eldersfield Lawn provided an increased range of sporting opportunities last year. The impact of this work has enabled more children to participate in a wide and extensive range of competitive sports through tournaments with other local schools. These opportunities have included Cross Country, Quicksticks, Hockey, Boccia, Athletics, Rugby, Netball, Football, Mini Tennis, Swimming Galas, Golf, Tag Rugby, Cricket and Equestrian events.	Equal opportunities have been provided for a fair representation of participation from both boys and girls. P.E. skills have been developed to a high standard which has been shown in some very positive outcomes of competitions results. The planning model used by Eldersfield Lawn during 2022-23 has proved to be sustainable. Capacity can remain during range next year and in the future.

<u>To provide a wide range of enriched sporting and physical activities for children</u> <u>Key Indicator 4 – Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to pupils</u>	During 2022-23 a wide range of enriched sporting and physical activities were provided. The impact of these saw the introduction of new physical experiences. This included Bell Boating, Outdoor Adventure Sports, residential, Archery and Athletics, Karate, Mini Tennis, Golf, Bikeability for Key Stage 2 children and Balance Bikes for Reception.	These additional enrichment opportunities are sustainable. Staff are experienced and knowledgeable, showing capacity for effectively supporting children with future opportunities. £2,500 (costs have at times been subsidised to provide these additional experiences)
<u>To promote increased opportunities for regular additional exercise (outside the weekly two hours of P.E. already being taught)</u> <u>Key Indicator 2- Engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity</u>	All children have had daily access to the large variety of outdoor play and gym equipment during breaktimes and lunchtimes. All children have been given the opportunity to complete the daily mile before the start of the school day. The impact of this has resulted in more children regularly accessing running as an additional activity which has contributed to improved stamina and faster running times.	Equal opportunities have been provided for all children from Reception to Year 6 to be able to access the outdoor equipment and the daily mile. £1,000 (maintenance and inspection costs for the outdoor equipment)

<u>To engage and motivate children to participate more in extra-curricular sports opportunities</u> <u>Key indicator 4 - Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to pupils</u>	The impact of regular extra-curricular opportunities have led to more children taking part in a range of sports over the year. Sporting skills have been developed with input from specialist coaches and providers for Football, Rugby, Cricket, Street Dance, Yoga, Dodge Ball, Handball, Mulit-hock, Rounders, Wonderball and Equestrian events.	A review of this provision showed around % of children have attended an extra-curricular sports club during 2022-23. The school is able to maintain these opportunities next year and beyond. Capacity will continue and extra-curricular clubs will be linked to tournaments where possible too. £283 (<i>Subsidised extra-curricular activities</i>) £250 (<i>National Schools Equestrian Association-NSEA annual membership</i>)

The swimming model the school follows has proved to be sustainable too.
